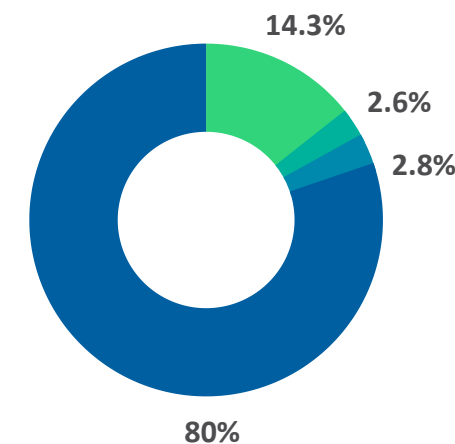

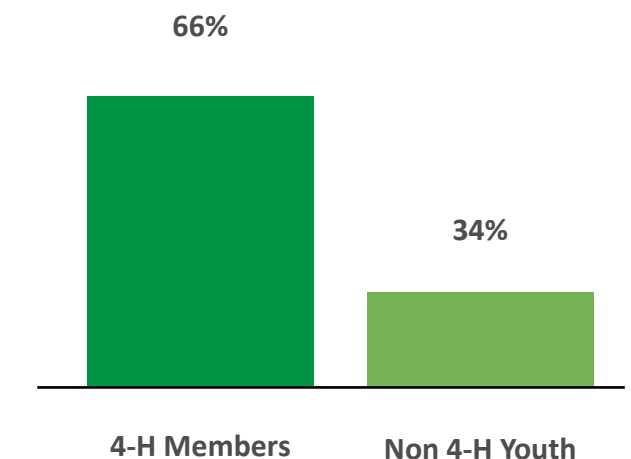

Field to Fork Challenge



QUICK FACT

After the challenge, 69% of participants reported considering a future career in agriculture or food!

Program Description

The Field to Fork Challenge program ran for the first time from June to November 2020. The objective was to engage 4-H and non-4-H youth in learning about and cooking with B.C. foods through participation in an online video competition and virtual conference.

4-H BC and BC Agriculture in the Classroom received 53 video submissions for the challenge from youth aged 9 to 19 from all over the province. The videos submitted by youth were judged on their use and knowledge of B.C. ingredients, evidence of thorough research, food and kitchen safety, and presentation.

Youth with the 20 winning videos were invited to participate in a virtual conference on November 7, 2020, which marked the end of the challenge. The virtual conference was an opportunity for youth to engage in

commodity-themed activities, virtual farm tours, Q&As with B.C. farmers, and a three-course cooking session with Celebrity Chef Randle. The winning recipes are featured in a Field to Fork Challenge Recipe Book.

By participating in the challenge, participants reported gaining agriculture knowledge, valuable cooking experience, food preparation skills, and an increased appreciation for B.C. foods.

“It was a very good experience. Building Community Connections

Program Description

On January 15, 2021, Canim Lake Band, 4-H BC, and Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Fisheries delivered a virtual open house for Indigenous communities throughout the province. The purpose of the event was to showcase and celebrate the ongoing success of Canim Valley 4-H Club, an Indigenous community led club that has been running for 37 years!

The 18 participants learned about providing opportunities for youth to build hands-on skills and develop leadership potential through 4-H. Canim Valley 4-H Club A Leader, Michelle Archie, has been a champion for the program for many years and presented on the opportunities offered for her community since the club started in 1984. 4-H @ HOME

Program Description

The 4-H @ Home project was launched in the spring of 2020 in response to the COVID-19 pandemic to support youth and families in exploring 4-H through self-directed learning. The 4-H @ Home project included 30 activities and was available to both 4-H and non 4-H youth in BC from April-December 2020.

The most popular activities were:

- Tractor Safety;
- Well Stocked Kitchen Cooking Challenge;
- Virtual Farm Tours for Pigs, Sheep, and Goats;
- Activity worksheets for Dog, Honeybee, Rabbit and Cavy.

Program Description

In 2020, the Discover 4-H Day Camps were able to provide youth without a 4-H club in their community, an opportunity to experience 4-H. Despite some challenges associated with COVID-19, we were able to overcome those barriers and safely host three day camps around the province. During the planning stages, we were unsure if people were going to attend the camps, because of COVID-19, but we were thrilled at how well the camps were received. We are proud that our new leaders are resilient and willing to start a club in one of the most challenging seasons to date.

Our first day camp in **Valemount** on **August 12th** was a huge success. We had a total of 13 youth age 5-13 participate and we are hopeful that a new club will be starting in the area soon.

Our second day camp was at the **Kamloops Indian Band** on **August 21st** where we engaged with the community members on how to bring 4-H to their youth.

Our third and final day camp was on **Malcolm Island** on **August 26th**. We had a total of 18 youth age 4-13 attend. We are excited to have new leaders starting a club on the island with their main projects focusing on poultry and outdoor living.

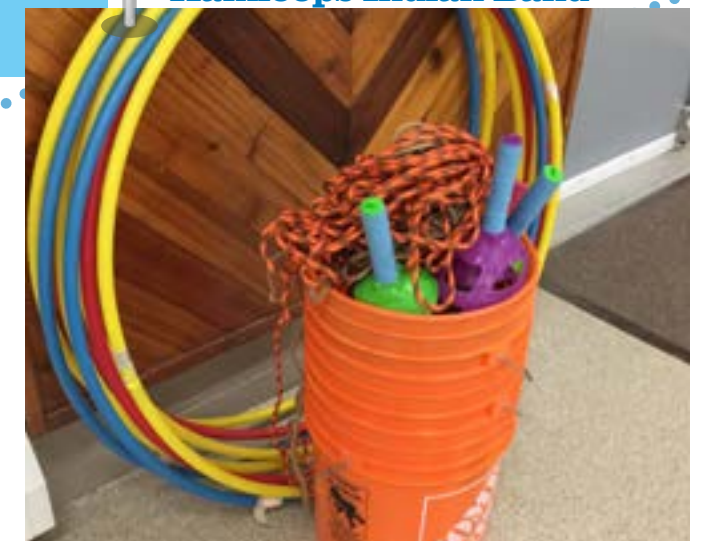

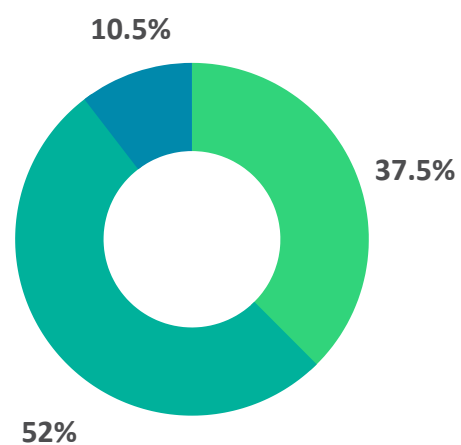

Program Description

Provincial 4-H Club Week 2020 hosted 36 4-H members from around British Columbia. The delegates, ages 16 to 19, gathered at RockRidge Canyon in Princeton for 6 days in March, before the COVID-19 restrictions took place. The theme of Provincial 4-H Club Week 2020 was “Risk & Rewards”. The conference was about personal direction, the choices that each day brings, and making decisions when presented with opportunities to grow and challenge yourself. Delegates were presented with many opportunities to explore their thoughts, beliefs, patterns and ways of relating with self and others. Delegates participated in individual and group experiences that were fun and challenging that encouraged them to take some risks and reap the rewards!

“Overall, Provincial Club Week was the most amazing, eye-opening time I’ve ever had. By being encouraged to share my inner thoughts, conversations led to some of the most deeply personal experiences of my life. PCW taught me to break down barriers, and to be confident and unafraid of new things. It helped me discover a lot more about who I am, who I want to be, and what I need to do to achieve that. I was lucky enough to share these moments with all the fantastic people I met. PCW brought us together from all four corners of the province, and I made so many trusting friends who gave me great advice, laughed, and even cried with me. Even though we’re miles away from one another now, I hope that these friendships will last far into the future.”

Food for Thought

Program Description

4-H BC's Food for Thought is a bi-annual program designed for 4-H members ages 14-15. The program first started over 10 years ago. A typical Food for Thought program is a week in length and focuses on agriculture awareness through engaging farm tours and presentations to teach the delegates about primary production in BC's agriculture industry. Delegates also engage in agriculture related discussions, debates and activities throughout the week.

In 2020, Food for Thought was modified due to the COVID-19 pandemic. Instead of inviting delegates to travel to one location at the same time, 4-H and Ministry of Agriculture staff traveled to six locations to deliver a reformatted day camp style program. The programs were one day in length and focused on virtual farm tours, Zoom presentations with agriculture professionals and low-touch, physically distanced agricultural themed activities.



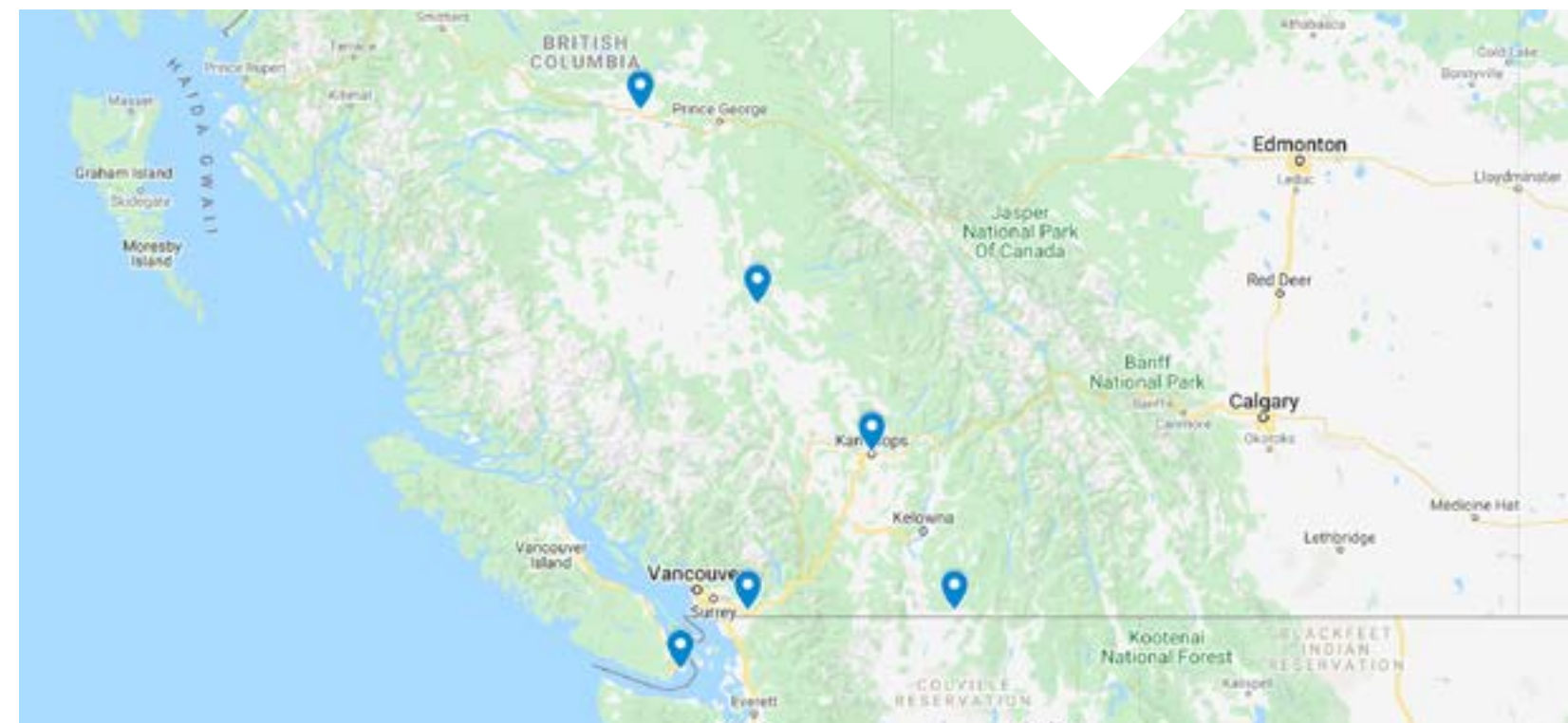
The dates and locations were as follows:

1. Abbotsford- July 21, 2020
2. Victoria- July 23, 2020
3. Rock Creek- August 4, 2020
4. Kamloops- August 6, 2020
5. Vanderhoof- August 18, 2020
6. Williams Lake- August 20, 2020

In an evaluation conducted at the end of each program, delegates were asked to reflect on what they had learned, how they would share this information within their communities, and if they enjoyed the program. 92% of the delegates reported that they learned either lots, or a great deal about BC Agriculture, while 80% reported that they had thought about how their food is produced as a result of attending the program. In addition to what they had learned, 80% of delegates reported that they had a lot of fun during the program and were very satisfied with their modified day camp experience!

Provincial Public Speaking Finals

Program Description

4-H BC's Provincial Public Speaking program brings together the top 4-H public speakers from around the province. This program allows members to further their communication skills. Members earn the opportunity to speak at the Provincial Finals by placing atop their Club, District, and Regional competitions. Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the 2020 conference was hosted virtually, over two Saturday's in August. 10 members, ages 15-19, were selected to represent their 4-H region.

On the first weekend, delegates were joined by Natalie Appleton of Read Head Studio Inc. who spoke about her career as a writer, her travels, and how we use different forms of communication in our daily lives.

Next, members were introduced to the speaking topic for the 2020 competition. Members were given one week to prepare a 5-7 minute speech on The Future of Farming: Agri-Technology and Innovation. The following weekend, members presented their speech for a panel of judges. The top three participants were:

1st: Elena S., Vancouver Island

2nd: Naomi C., Fraser Valley

3rd: Emily C., Fraser Valley

The top placing participant was awarded an all-expenses paid trip to compete in the Canadian Young Speakers for Agriculture Competition in 2021.

Leadership Symposium

Program Description

Leadership Symposium is a bi-annual conference for 4-H BC leaders to connect, learn and share with fellow leaders from around the Province! Typically hosted over a weekend in the Fall, the Symposium offers breakout sessions, guest speakers and leader training for participants to discover and grow their leadership skills. There is always a creative theme for each conference that encourages leaders to dress up and participate in fun activities!

This year, due to the COVID-19 Pandemic, the Leadership Symposium was hosted as a day-long virtual event on October 17, 2020. The theme was 20/20 Vision and

leaders were encouraged to wear green glasses that were included in their conference packages. In total we had 45 4-H BC leaders and 9 staff wearing green glasses!

Participants had the opportunity to watch keynote and guest presentations from Dr. Jody Carrington, Brenda Herchmer, the Canadian Mental Health Association and the Honorable Janet Austin, Lieutenant Governor of British Columbia. They also participated in breakout sessions such as Positive Youth Development with 4-H Canada and Youth Farm Safety with the Progressive Agriculture Foundation.



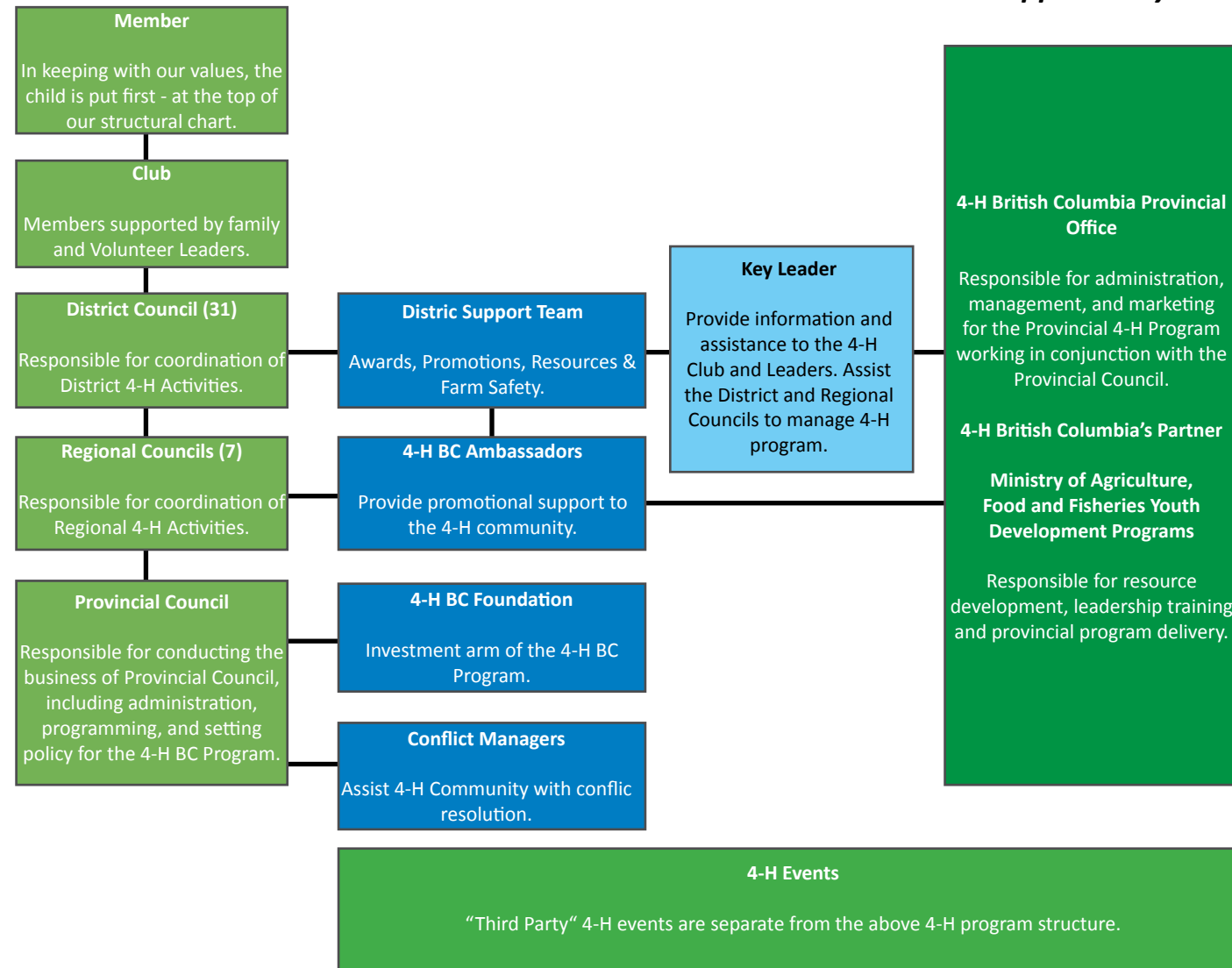

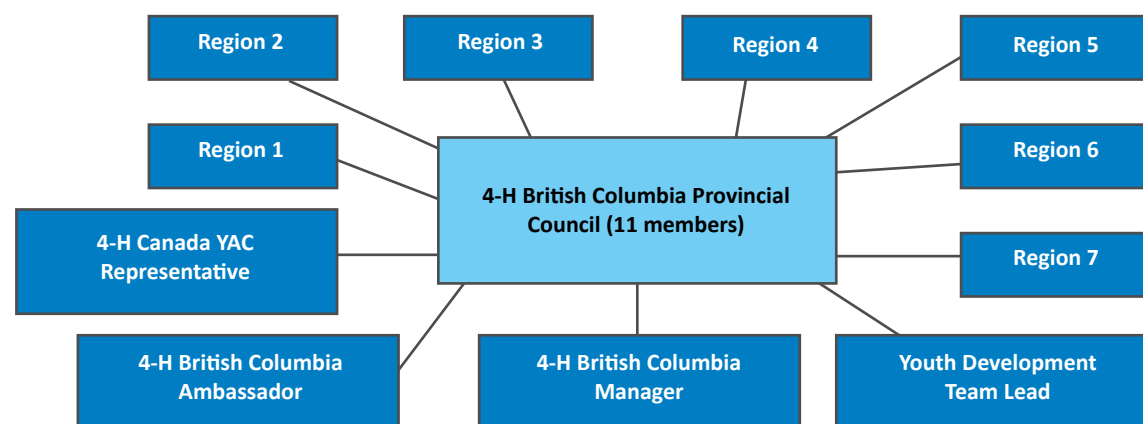

Minister of Agriculture, Food and Fisheries

2020 was a year unlike we have ever seen before, and I know it was particularly challenging for the province’s youth. Events and gatherings looked a little different and ensuring the health and safety of all 4-H British Columbia members, organizers and volunteers was always the main priority. And while the pandemic may have slowed things down, with physical distancing and other restrictive measures, 4-H BC had another successful year.

The B.C. government committed \$153,000 to 4-H BC this year for our annual funding to the organization. Within that, \$63,000 was dedicated to youth farm safety and outreach programs to support underrepresented groups, to ensure the province’s young farmers have the support they need and provide a place for youth from all corners of the province to learn life skills and gain confidence.

While attending the 4-H to the Extreme event in Abbotsford in March 2020, I had the pleasure of announcing \$50,000 for the Field to Fork Challenge. 4-H members were challenged to create and submit videos of themselves preparing a recipe highlighting a B.C. ingredient, such as produce, meat, dairy, grain or honey, and include how the ingredient was farmed, raised or processed and how it can be used in culinary creations.

In the summer, 4-H BC adapted the Food for Thought conference into a series of six one-day agriculture awareness programs in Abbotsford, Rock Creek, Kamloops, Williams Lake, Vanderhoof and Saanich, for 4-H members aged 14 to 15 years. By organizing virtual



farm tours and keeping the groups small, 4-H was able to help ensure the safety of the participating members while allowing them to learn more about agriculture. This past year has really shown the adaptability and strength of the organization. From changing youth and volunteer programs into virtual formats and creating new 4-H @ Home projects so members could complete activities and continue to develop program skills at home, 4-H BC offered safe ways to support and engage with members.

Thank you to the organizers, leaders and volunteers for the on-going work and support, I know B.C.’s future farmers and community leaders are in good hands! I look forward to the coming year when we can safely be together in person again.



Ministry of Agriculture

Throughout 2020 the Youth Development Program staff from the Ministry of Agriculture, Food and Fisheries collaborated with 4-H BC to create and adapt programs that adhered to provincial COVID health guidelines. The Ministry provided a third year of extra funding to 4-H BC to further grow farm safety programming for youth, support new clubs and volunteers, and increase outreach to potential new members from under-represented groups. It was very exciting to see several new clubs start in 2020 despite the difficult circumstances. Another highlight of 2020 was achieving provincial program accreditation for the first time through 4-H Canada.

In September, Marika Laird joined the Youth Development team as a temporary Youth Development Specialist based in Abbotsford. Lauren Bernardi and Jarrett Chung-Smith both continued as Youth Development Specialists in Abbotsford and Vernon respectively. Karla Barrie continued to work part time in Williams Lake as the Youth Development Assistant. We were also happy to have the support of co-op student Cassi Sauer from May to December 2020. The whole Youth Development team worked diligently this year to deliver programs including 4-H @ HOME, Provincial Club Week, 4-H to the Extreme, Ambassador Program, Food for Thought, Field to Fork Challenge, Gardening Basics Webinar Series, Provincial Communications, Special Educational Display Competition, Provincial Leadership Symposium, and 4-H Leader and Key Leader Training. We were also pleased to release updated educational materials including the online Leader and Key Leaders toolkits, interactive judging quizzes, and foods project resources.



2020 was a challenging year for everyone. In these uncertain times youth need a sense of community and opportunities to grow and challenge themselves more than ever. The Youth Development Team would like to salute all the 4-H BC leaders, volunteers, and families who went above and beyond in 2020 to support and create opportunities for young people in their communities. We look forward to working with you in 2021 and hopefully getting back to doing some of the 4-H activities that we all love most.

Vancouver Island

The Fraser Valley 4-H Region consists of the following five districts:

In spite of the challenges presented by COVID-19, most clubs and districts were able to provide successful and safe programs for their members. The adaptability and creativity of leaders, members and families was proven over and over again! Membership was down compared to 2019.

Since the provincial communication final was postponed until late summer, regional communication events were able to be held safely in person in July and August. Most districts had completed their speech competitions prior to the lockdown. Several districts were able to have Speak and Show competitions in the summer. Participation was lower than in the previous year.

Members from across the region participated in Provincial Club Week and Food for Thought. We had seven Ambassadors – three in their second year and four in their first year.

We had five AgMent members who organized a Regional Judging Rally for senior members. They had

started planning an in person judging workshop event and had to change course to provide a virtual rally instead. It was an excellent opportunity for our senior members as well as a great learning experience for the AgMent members who faced significant challenges with planning.

Many members participated in virtual competitions at the region's fairs. Aldergrove Fair, Maple Ridge - Pitt Meadows Countryfest, Chilliwack Fair and the PNE all provided virtual activities for 4-H members. The PNE also had 4-H clubs participate in their drive through fair. The fair boards are to be commended for their effort to provide these opportunities for the members. It was very much appreciated!

We also had members participate in the Field to Fork Challenge and 4-H@Home. Although not many members completed 4-H@Home projects, many of them learned a lot from the virtual activities that they did.

Many thanks to all of our 4-H supporters, volunteers, leaders, families and members who kept the momentum going in 2020. It kept our region strong to continue into 2021 looking forward to a more normal year, knowing that we can be successful even with huge challenges.

Kootenay

The Kootenay Region is made up of five clubs shared between two Districts. Unlike other regions in BC, Kootenay 4-H kicks off in the fall of every year and runs through to June. As I reflect back on our achievements during the past 4-H year, I realize, we may be small in numbers, but we are mighty in 4-H spirit.

Collectively, our 4-H spirit has carried us through this year. Members participated in a variety of livestock, foods, photography, small engines, Cloverbuds, and craft projects. In lead up to our 2020 4-H year, a delegation of nine youth and two chaperones representing two clubs participated in the 4-H Canada Club to Club Exchange. As community ambassadors, our members contributed at local fall fairs, food banks, parades and community dinners.

Our annual 4-H Regional Camp was a success in large part because of our dedicated volunteers and the best camp cook in the Kootenay. Safe with 4-H Progressive Agriculture Safety Day challenged our 4-H youth to be safety leaders in their communities. During our Club, District and Regional public speaking competitions, we saw glimpses of future leaders as members spoke on topics like birds, blacksmithing and climate change.

The arrival of the Coronavirus changed our 4-H landscape. But our 4-H community was undeterred. Together, 4-H leaders with the support of sponsors, local businesses and community members, were able to host a livestock sale and found creative ways to

celebrate the achievements of 4-H members.

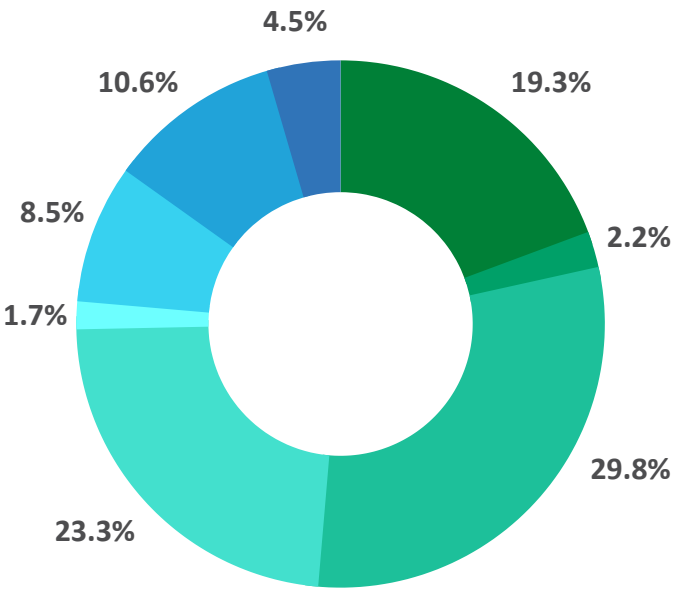

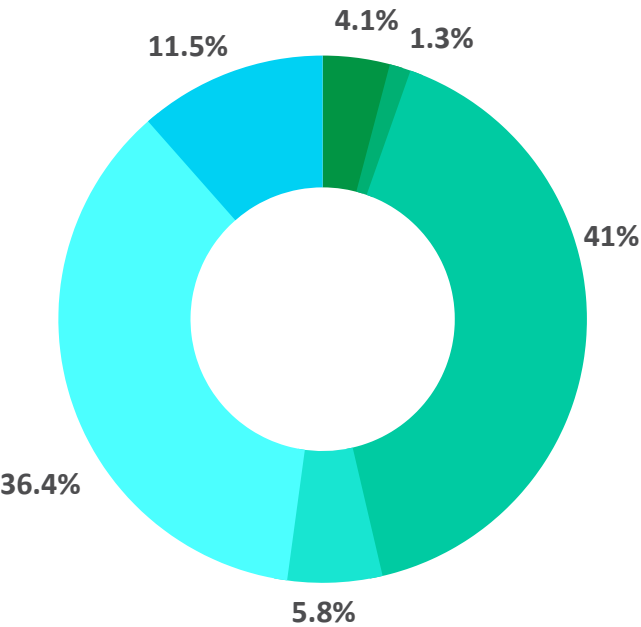

Foundation revenues have come from investments, 4-H Club assessments, donations, and fundraising. Total Foundation assets as of Dec 31, 2020, were **\$1,543,803**. Returns continue to result from a well-balanced investment policy and our investment advisors at CIBC Wood Gundy. Accumulated 2020 disbursements to 4-H BC. Provincial Council were as follows: **\$71,000** for ongoing Provincial 4-H Programs and services, **\$11,625** for Designated Gift initiatives, and **\$50,564** for the Extraordinary Funds (loan) initiative between 4-H BC Provincial Council and 4-H BC Foundation; a total of **\$133,189** disbursed to support 4-H. While COVID-19 impacted our ability to connect with individuals and organizations for new donations, our return on investments has continued strong, given our long-term well-balanced investment strategy.

4-H BC Foundation has expanded its mandate through **Designated Gifts**, whereby a donor directs the annual earnings from their donation to go to a specific 4-H program, region or district. Thanks to the hard work of **Leonard Marriott** and other 4-H alumni donors
