# Ambassador Report

**AMBASSADOR REPORT** - Lara Pavon, Sarah van Heeswijk, and Danusia Tarr

2021 was a challenging year for the 4-H BC Ambassador team. Program co-founder and leader Suzanne Skaaning passed away in May, after more than 20 years of leading the Ambassador team. Three ambassadors left the program part way through the year due to various personal circumstances. Despite the challenges, the remaining 16 ambassadors completed the following in 2021:

- 7 Presentations on the 4-H Foundation
- 51 social media engagements
- 67 thank you's to regional and provincial 4-H sponsors
- 12 articles submitted to various publications
- 30 4-H promotions at public events
- 27 project and program workshops to 4-H clubs
- 9 opportunities to act as the official judge for 4-H competitions
- 45 reports of hosting or helping with 4-H events

Ambassadors noted the following activities as some personal highlights: creating a video about using a cabbage as a pH indicator for the Science and Technology Pillar in the 4-H @ Home program, staffing 4-H booths at events, writing articles about 4-H, visits to schools, radio interviews, presentations about the 4-H BC Foundation, judging at events, social media campaigns, and showing their 4-H Colours in November.

A highlight for the whole team was the Ambassador Training Weekend held at Trinity Western University in Langley, July 31st to August 3rd 2021. This in-person event allowed the team to bond as a group,

create lots of new friendships, and learn about the Ambassadors role in the 4-H program.

# Special Project



## #growstronger

2021 Ambassador team partners with Kubota for the #growstronger challenge. Kubota modelled the challenge after Victory Gardens in hopes to boost morale and assist with the food supply. Despite challenges with heat domes, drought, and wildfires in 2021, more than half of the ambassadors participated in the project with two ambassadors winning awards for their gardens!

# The Great Pumpkin Challenge

## Program Description

The 4-H BC Great Pumpkin Challenge 2021 was a new gardening contest for registered 4-H BC members of all ages!

Members were able to register for two different categories:

- 1. **The heaviest giant pumpkin** - members were challenged to grow a giant pumpkin using the Dill’s Atlantic Giant variety.
- 2. **The best miniature pumpkin craft creation** - members were challenged with their imaginations to create a craft out of as many mini pumpkins as they could grow, using the Jack Be Little variety.

Registration for the contest opened at the end of April and by the middle of May, 50 members had registered for the giant pumpkin category and 45 for the miniature pumpkin craft creation category! Members also had the option to register for both categories.

Registered members were then sent out a contest package including their seed varieties, growing tips and resources and more details about the contest.



Members were asked to plant their seeds no earlier than May 31.

Typically, pumpkins of all varieties take about 90-110 days to mature, so members had until September 30, or 4 months, to grow and harvest their pumpkins and prepare their submissions.

Due to the extreme heat and wildfires that many regions across BC experienced this summer, a large portion of the Pumpkin Challenge contestants were not able to grow their giant and miniature pumpkins. However, we still received 12 entries for each category from a total of 21 4-H members- everyone did a fantastic job!

## Provincial Programs

### Enrolment & Participation

4-H BC continued to face programming challenges in 2021, thanks to the varied and constantly changing health orders caused by the evolving COVID-19 virus. 4-H’ers live by the motto ‘Learn to Do by Doing’ and that has served us well over the past two years.

There is no handbook for how to run youth centered programming in the midst of a pandemic, however the creativity and perseverance of the 4-H BC board, office staff, Youth Development team, and volunteer leaders enabled us to present all our usual provincial programming (in COVID safe modified formats) as well as some successful new events.

- Careers in Plant & Animal Health Sciences
- Aquaculture Careers with the BC Salmon Farmers Association Youth Council
- Careers in Viticulture & The BC Wine Industry



## Program Description

Youth Action is usually a 5 day in-person summer program that looks at important youth issues while developing leadership skills and building self-esteem.

Due to COVID-19 overnight camp restrictions, the 2021 Youth Action program was presented as a series of 4 one-day day camps. Members were able to attend the camp closest to their home with day camps held in Delta, Vanderhoof, Williams Lake, and Kamloops. 59 youth from across the province participated in the program which included both virtual presentations and in-person activities.

Alison Springer, a Youth Communications Specialist with a passion for helping youth discover their greatness, conducted a webinar about uncovering your unique leadership qualities, and finding purpose in all you do. Alison's session was followed by fun leadership games and a Q&A period with Olympic medalist, Natasha Watcham-Roy.



# Field to Fork Challenge

## Program Description

The 2021 Field to Fork Challenge program ran for the second time from June to November 2021. The objective of the program was to engage 4-H and non-4-H youth in learning about and cooking with B.C. grown ingredients through participation in a video competition and virtual conference. The challenge was open to 4-H junior and senior members and all BC students in grades 4-12.

The online cooking competition received a total of 66 submissions from across British Columbia. The judging categories were: 4-H junior members (born 2008-2011), 4-H senior members (born 2001-2007), grade 4-7 students, and grade 8-12 students. In the 4-H categories we received submissions from 14 juniors and 18 seniors. In the BC student categories, there were submissions from 28 grade 4-7 students and 6 grade 8-12 students. All participant videos were judged on their use and knowledge of BC ingredients, evidence of thorough research, food and kitchen safety, and presentation.

The top 10 winners from each category were invited to participate in the Field to Fork Challenge virtual conference on November 13, 2021. The conference was an all-day event with a morning session focused on learning about agriculture and our 3 featured BC grown commodities: chicken, honey, and hazelnuts. The afternoon included a virtual cook-along with BCAITC’s Chef Randle and special guest BC Minister of Agriculture, Food, and Fisheries, the Honourable Lana Popham.

The winning participants were showcased in a highlight video using footage from the challenge as well as a recipe book featuring the winning dishes.



# Provincial Communication Finals

## Program Description

The 4-H BC Provincial Communication Finals were hosted on August 12-14, 2021 in Prince George, BC. 16 4-H BC members participated, each earning a spot at the program by competing at their local 4-H BC communications competitions.

Activities included a communications workshop, followed by a day of agriculture tours in and around Prince George. The conference culminated with the Provincial Communications competition. Public speaking participants were provided 40 minutes to prepare a 2-6 minute speech on an agriculture-awareness topic, based on the previous day's tours. This years topic was "Agriculture's Impact on Community".

Speak and Show competitors presented an 8-10 minute demonstration on a chosen agriculture and/or food theme. After going virtual in 2020, we were thrilled to once again host this conference in-person, welcoming 4-H youth and their families to Prince George.



# Leadership Symposium

## Program Description

21 4-H BC volunteer leaders gathered for an eventful weekend of fun, friendship and 4-H.

The symposium provided leaders with the opportunity to improve leadership skills, exchange ideas and relax! Leaders learned more about 4-H in British Columbia and found out about all the great things that leaders and members were doing around the province. 2021's theme was Mission Possible, with the Keynote speaker Beth Hanishewski delivering on "Powerful Tools to Re-Engage Your Team in Crazy Times!"



In addition to existing programs, two new programs were launched, SPEC (Strong Peoples, Environment and Communities) Day Camps and Provincial Virtual Judging Rally. To round out the year, Leadership Symposium was held in Vernon, BC, where leaders gathered to re-energize, exchange ideas and have fun! We are extremely grateful to the BC Ministry of Agriculture Youth Development Program team for ensuring that 4-H members and leaders were provided with the same high standard of meaningful and engaging program experience as in previous years. Of course, the 4-H year wouldn't be complete without the opportunity for members and leaders to show off their talents and skills and win prizes in the process! 2021 contests included

Virtual Educational Display, Pumpkin Growing, Photography, Field to Fork Challenge and Keepsake Ornament. In 2011, 4-H BC in partnership with PrairieCoast Equipment, held the first of what was to become a very successful and popular Gator Lottery. In 2021 the lottery changed from a biannual event with two Gators to an annual event with one Gator plus supplementary prizes and online ticket sales. This new outline enables clubs to participate in an annual fundraising activity earning \$3.50 for each ticket purchase attributed to their club. Many thanks to PrairieCoast Equipment for their continued support and to Ritchie Smith Feeds, Pharmasave, First West Credit Union and Save-On-Foods for their generous prize donations. In celebration of National 4-H Day, the BC Legislative Buildings in Victoria, BC were lit up green on November 3rd. Additionally, a delegation of 4-H members and leaders were invited to attend Question Period in the Legislature and then meet with the Honorable Lana Popham, BC Minister of Agriculture, Food & Fisheries. I would like to thank Ambassador Sarah M. for making all of this happen by taking the initiative to put forward the request to the BC Government. Way to go Sarah! I am indebted to the wonderful team that I am privileged to work with every day and deeply appreciative of the support and guidance of the 4-H BC Provincial Council and 4-H BC Foundation. Thank you to our 2021 sponsors and donors for their ongoing generosity and commitment to the sustainability of the world-class 4-H program that we all enjoy so much. Without a doubt, the real heroes of 4-H are the leaders, parents and volunteers that give tirelessly of their time, and share their knowledge and experience to shape 4-H members into the leaders of tomorrow!



# Minister of Agriculture and Food

4-H British Columbia members, organizers and volunteers displayed the same energy and drive as always as they rolled out programs and events during 2021. All that hard work resulted in another successful year for 4-H BC. The ministry's Youth Development Team works closely with 4-H. I appreciate how much work is involved in club activities and 4-H can be proud of the rewards its programs bring to young people all over our province. B.C government's annual funding of \$150,000 provided the resources needed to support new clubs and outreach to potential new members from under-represented groups. This included bringing 4-H to the Fraser Canyon and Sea to Sky districts, launching the first ever fully online 4-H club in B.C., and in keeping with 4-H's value of keeping youth safe, supported training for 28 volunteers to receive instruction in Farm and Mental Health Safety to prepare them to offer such support. The popular Field to Fork Challenge also had another successful year. 4-H members were challenged to create and submit videos of themselves preparing a recipe highlighting B.C. ingredients. Thirty-six entries were included in the 2021 Field to Fork Challenge Recipe Book from among the many amazing recipe and video submissions from B.C. youth. I still smile at the memory of joining you all from my home kitchen to share the recipe for my favourite BC kale salad as a part of the virtual conference for the Challenge winners. I'm also hopeful that the Agriculture Career Quest conference offered some inspiration about a career in agriculture or food, possibly even moving a few of our young delegates to consider a career in our ministry! Our staff and scientists at the Plant and Animal



Health Branch shared how their pathways in science brought them into agriculture. And there are other opportunities for agrologists, industry, food safety and innovation specialists, and marketing experts to name a few. We also were able to deliver several in-person programs including the Ambassador Program, Provincial Communications Finals, Youth Action Day Camps, SPEC (Strong People, Environment and Communities) Day Camps, and the Provincial Leadership Symposium. We were pleased to release several new and updated educational resources, including the new soil science project, an agriculture and food career video series, beginner units in the rabbit and cavy projects, and revised poultry project units.

2021 was another unprecedented year of uncertainty. The Youth Development Team would like to express our appreciation for all the 4-H BC leaders and volunteers who continued to be resilient and flexible in adjusting and adapting 4-H programming for young people in their communities. # Regional Reports

Yellowhead West has 4 districts which comprises the Vanderhoof District, Skeena District, Bulkley Valley District and Lakes District. In 2021 we had less members overall but still had a good year. Traditionally our Region has met in person twice a year - Spring and Fall, mainly due to the distance between our Districts. Due to Covid19 we held meetings via Zoom every 3 months and this worked very well and meant that we could meet more often. Going forward we plan to have a mix of in-person and virtual meetings which will help with communication within our Region.


